FUTURE EVENTS

- Looking into the Fall/Winter of this year. I think it would be great to figure out as a group what Events we can provide for the Community to prepare PRIOR to Show Season for example: Clinics, Ride A Tests, Symposiums and Schooling Shows in the various areas of RMDS.
- I feel there is a need after Regionals/Nationals for us all to evaluate what we learned from Showing this year and what do we need to prepare ourselves and our horses for next year. Whether improving you score, going up another level or dealing with just the stress of shows. I know as a Competitor myself I always do this, set my goals, talk to my trainer, and we set out a clear plan ahead of time for what events etc. to attend to achieve my goals prior to show season.
- If I attend clinics during Show Season usually the reason is the weather is better and I can get my Horses off Property, give me confidence, deal with my stress of trailering etc. confirm I am going in the right direction or gathering tools to get that score up a point.
- Also it is important to support out Trainers as well. Bringing Clinicians in also provides additional education for them and their goals during Training Season.
- In short I know there is some Weather Restrictions in Colorado but I do think it can be done to help the overall Dressage Community with some effort:
 - Local Trainers can travel to different areas within RMDS and provide clinics, keeping costs down.
 - Educational Zoom Events
 - Virtual schooling shows or Ride A Tests
 - o Clinics and Schooling Shows in respective areas of RMDS (less traveling for all)
 - o if limited stalls maybe provide a Schooling Show over a two day period versus one so others have the opportunity to attend i.e. a rider shows only one day only.
 - o Symposium for all Trainers, AA and/JR Young Riders would be awesome between Oct-Dec.
 - I am also happy to Host any Event in any area of RMDS that helps the Community if the Event Space is available

Also good to note that everyone has a Budget for Clinics/Shows and if we have too much on the Calendar then some events will never fill. Private Events/Private Barns obviously not a concern.



Exploring a Lendon Gray clinic in Colorado

I am exploring with Dressage 4 Kids (D4K) having Lendon Gray out to do one of her TEAM Clinics.

Holding D4K clinics in CO would open up other avenues for our youth such as Lendon knowing local riders if they apply for her Winter Intensive or other D4K events, as well as the D4K horse match program.

D4K runs on a different model from what we are used to: D4K collects the fees and pays for Lendon's travel and expenses – from us they would ask for logistical support on the ground (finding a host location willing to donate the arena, help marketing). Revenue to RMDS would be from audit fees (we could also hold an one-day adult clinic in conjunction, for which we could also charge audit fees). Therefore the budget is small (lunches etc) but the income to RMDS may also be small based on auditors. Because this is not the usual clinic model, I would like the Board's input on whether I should pursue further.

D4K TEAM Clinic Budget

Additional tasks: We locate a facility willing to donate an arena with room for auditors for this event. Facility can charge for stabling, shavings, etc.

We assist with marketing in the area.

We find volunteers to do 2 lectures per day at lunch and after rides (e.g., colic, shoeing, psychology, etc.) If someone would like to host Lendon at their house nearby the facility, D4K appreciates such offers.

We can potentially get sponsors for the water, coffee, lunch to reduce expenses.

D4K provides: Lendon's time for lessons

Collection of funds from riders

Travel arrangements and related expenses

Insurance for the event Event on D4K calendar

Other notes: Cost for riders would be \$250 + stabling and facility fees for the weekend (payable to D4K)

Monetary risk for RMDS is quite low, and as long as we can get a good number of auditors, this clinic can make money for RMDS.

Lendon can often stay an extra day to offer an AA clinic. Lauren and Pippa are in communication on this. RMDS can charge what they want to above Lendon's fee and have auditors for the optional AA clinic. For the first D4K clinic in an area, Lendon likes to do the clinic personally. Future clinics may be a staff member.

We are going to pursue looking at the October 29-30 date for having Lendon come out and do a clinic and add a day for AAs afterwards.

2022 RMDS PROFESSIONALS' SYMPOSIUM

Event Summary: The RMDS Professionals' Symposium featuring Lilo Fore was held April 23-24, 2022, at Tomora Training Center in Greeley, CO. There were 8 horse/rider combinations and there were 13 auditors on Saturday and 17 auditors on Sunday. Dolly Hannon acted as moderator all day Saturday and half day on Sunday. Kathy Simard took over as the moderator on Sunday afternoon. Beth Geier handled the registration desk and organized the lunch orders and Joan Clay was the overall organizer.

Nicole Roach-Reisvold and Natalie Ellis, Tomora owners, went above and beyond the call of duty as facility hosts for this event. Out of concern for the visiting horses during the windstorm, they moved some of their personal horses to allow the clinic horses to stay in permanent stalls all weekend. This was very much appreciated by the riders and allowed the horses to be safe and well rested for their rides. The footing quality was excellent and was well maintained throughout the weekend and the indoor arena and seating area were beautifully set up in advance. Tomora donated coffee and snacks and they also had a very nice table arrangement for lunch service, which facilitated great conversation and social time during the lunch hour.

As always, Lilo's instruction was of exceptionally high quality and her answers to questions and feedback during the discussion sessions was very interesting, informative, and much appreciated by the riders and the auditors. The feedback from the riders and auditors was very positive with high praise for the instruction, the quality of the horses and riders, the format, and the facility. There was minimal negative feedback offered on the evaluations.

The primary areas of improvement would be to make sure that side conversations were taken outside so everyone could hear and that we stop the wind (HA!).

There was a very good response for the call for riders with 14 horses applying for the 8 available rides. Our auditor attendance was lower than expected, with only 11 paid auditors on Saturday and 15 paid auditors on Sunday (Joan Clay and Dolly Hannon were auditing for free, due to their involvement as organizer and moderator, respectively). This event received USDF University accreditation, and 5 participants chose to pay the extra fees to get USDF University Credit. The required USDF materials, evaluations and fees were mailed on USDF on April 25, 2022.

Finances: A separate budget worksheet is included with this report. The expenses were well managed with no surprises, and we came in under the original budgeted amount by \$446. Unfortunately, the income received was less than planned due to a lower turnout of auditors than expected. We had 11 paying auditors on Saturday and 15 paying auditors on Sunday, but we expected 20 paying auditors each day. We had planned on receiving \$3000 of auditor income, but we only received \$1875 from auditors.

This event did receive a \$1000 grant from The Dressage Foundation's Max Gahwyler Fund, which helped immensely to cover our shortfall. All required evaluation materials were returned to TDF on May 10, 2022. The original budget did not list \$500 from the RMDS Professional's Committee 2022 budget, because we had hoped to have broken even without any extra funds from RMDS. We will need to use the \$500 allotted to the RMDS Professional's Committee for 2022. With these additional sources of income, we still experienced a loss of \$44.10.

AUDITOR ATTENDANCE

The possible reasons for decreased attendance are listed below:

- 1. There were many RMDS events during April and early May, so professionals may have had to pick and choose which events they could attend to still balance meeting their workload and client needs (for example coaching at a show or taking a client to a clinic). Here are the events that occurred during April and early May 2022 that may have created time constraints for area professionals.
 - a. April 16-17, 2022: RMDS Adult Amateur Clinic with George Williams
 - b. April 23-24, 2022: RMDS Professionals' Clinic featuring Lilo Fore
 - c. April 23, 2022: Pikes Peak Dressage Show (RMDS Recognized) PPD is a chapter of RMDS
 - d. April 23-24, 2022: Grand Valley Schooling Show GVDS is a chapter of RMDS
 - e. April 29-May 1: Robert Dover Symposium presented by Northern Colorado Dressage Association NCDA is a chapter of RMDS.
 - f. May 6-8, 2022: Dressage for the Cure, RMDS/USEF/USDF Recognized and qualifier for NAYC, USEF Festival of Champions & USEF Young Horse Championships
- 2. We had to raise auditor fees.
- 3. We scheduled the symposium on a weekend when it had typically been scheduled on a weekday. We had previously received feedback from participants asking for a weekend schedule. However, I think all the weekend events made it difficult for some professionals to find 1 or 2 days to attend this event.
- 4. The weather was horrible (high wind events with high wildfire danger for several days in a row) which may have prevented some people from attending as a walk-in.
- 5. This event hasn't happened since 2018, so people are out of the habit of making time for this symposium in their calendar.

RMDS needs to make sure this event is scheduled without so many other events on the same and surrounding weekends, if possible. We may also want to consider going back to a weekday schedule. However, we had this

event scheduled for the same weekend in 2020, 2021 and 2022, so the other events/shows got added due to clinician and facility availability and it was hard to coordinate everyone's activities after having so many cancellations and postponements over the past two years.

NEW BUSINESS

- 1) Investigating offering a USDF Certified Instructor/Trainer Workshop Series in 2023 at the suggestion of Annie Morris.
- 2) Need to start plans for the next RMDS Professionals' Symposium in 2024.
